Dozens of officers injured as up to 150,000 join Tommy Robinson rally Twenty-six police officers were injured, four seriously, during a protest led by far-right activist Tommy Robinson that drew up to 150,000 people in central London. The Unite the Kingdom rally turned violent as some protesters threw bottles and other objects at police, the Met said. Elon Musk addressed crowds via videolink, while 5,000 joined a nearby Stand Up To Racism counter-protest. The Met deployed 1,500 officers, including reinforcements from other forces. Police reported 24 arrests for various offences, calling the violence "wholly unacceptable." Assistant Commissioner Matt Twist said officers upheld the law despite significant challenges and violent intent from some.



Rooftop solar can power 370 homes, council says Brighton & Hove City Council said solar panels on five leisure centres have generated one million kWh of renewable energy, enough to power 370 homes or 500 electric vehicles for a year. Withdean Leisure Centre produced over 500,000 kWh, while Moulsecoomb, Portslade, Prince Regent, and Stanley Deason generated the rest. The energy helps cut costs and emissions, with 97% of power from Prince Regent's panels used on-site. Any surplus is exported to the grid, generating extra income. Matt Wickham of Freedom Leisure said the panels support sustainability, reduce expenses, and make the centres more environmentally friendly for the future.



Man arrested as suspicious item and made safe A 62-year-old man has been arrested in Leeds after suspicious chemicals and an item were found at a house on Lingmoor Street, Osmondthorpe. Police first detained him on Friday and rearrested him on Sunday on suspicion of possessing an explosive substance for unlawful purposes. Specialist teams worked throughout the weekend, and by Sunday evening the item was declared "made safe." A cordon was extended on Sunday morning, forcing some residents to evacuate, but was later reduced, allowing people to return home. West Yorkshire Police said the cordon was a precautionary measure and confirmed officers remain at the scene.
