South Korea would accept a Trump-Kim deal to freeze nuclear programme South Korean President Lee Jae Myung said he would support a deal between Donald Trump and Kim Jong Un in which North Korea freezes, rather than eliminates, its nuclear weapons. North Korea reportedly produces 15–20 weapons annually and declared itself a nuclear power in 2022, vowing never to disarm. Lee called a freeze "a feasible, realistic alternative" and emphasized pursuing achievable goals while keeping long-term denuclearization in mind. He seeks peaceful relations with the North, contrasting the tension under former President Yoon, and believes renewed Trump-Kim talks are possible, which could benefit South Korea and global security.

Anger in Australia after telecom outage linked to deaths Australian officials have vowed "significant consequences" for telecom giant Optus after a systems outage left hundreds unable to call emergency services for 13 hours, linked to at least three deaths. The outage affected South Australia, Western Australia, Northern Territory, and parts of New South Wales. Optus waited 40 hours to alert the public and regulators, drawing criticism. CEO Stephen Rue cited a network upgrade fault and apologized. The Australian Communications and Media Authority condemned the company's handling, noting prior failures. Communications Minister Anika Wells said providers have "no excuse" for triple-0 failures, warning that Optus' repeated lapses harmed the public and will face repercussions.



Super typhoon nears
Philippines as
thousands evacuate

Thousands have been evacuated in the Philippines ahead of super typhoon Ragasa, described as potentially "catastrophic." With winds reaching 230 km/h, Ragasa is forecast to hit northern islands Monday before moving west toward southern China, bringing life-threatening storm surges over 3m. Schools and government offices, including in Manila, have closed amid warnings of flooding, landslides, and infrastructure damage. Remote Batanes and Babuyan islands, home to 20,000 people, face the hardest impact. Taiwan and Hong Kong are also preparing for heavy rains and strong winds, with flight cancellations and closures. The storm follows weeks of severe monsoon flooding in the Philippines.
