Copenhagen and Oslo airports forced to close temporarily due to drone sightings

Denmark and Norway closed their main airports Monday night after drone sightings disrupted air traffic. Copenhagen Airport halted take-offs and landings for nearly four hours, affecting about 20,000 passengers and diverting 35 flights, before reopening at 00:30 local time. Oslo Airport also closed for four hours. Danish police said the drones appeared to be flown by a "capable operator" showing off, with no signs of malicious intent. Authorities would not confirm drone origin, though Ukrainian President Zelensky linked the incident to "Russia's violation" of NATO airspace. Police stressed no immediate evidence connects the incidents in Denmark and Norway.



US Supreme Court to revisit laws curtailing Trump's power to fire top officials

The US Supreme Court ruled 6-3 that President Donald Trump can dismiss Federal Trade Commission Commissioner Rebecca Slaughter, weakening protections for independent agencies. The decision revives debate over the 1935 Humphrey's Executor precedent, which had limited presidential power to remove agency officials. Justice Elena Kagan dissented, warning it gives Trump unchecked authority to eliminate bipartisan safeguards. Slaughter and fellow Democrat Alvaro Bedoya were fired in March, though a judge deemed Slaughter's removal unlawful. The Court will hear arguments in December on overturning Humphrey's Executor. Separately, it is weighing Trump's attempt to remove Federal Reserve governor Lisa Cook.

Jimmy Kimmel show to return after suspension over **Charlie Kirk**

US comedian Jimmy Kimmel will return to his late-night show Tuesday after Disney suspended him for jokes about conservative influencer Charlie Kirk's death. The suspension followed FCC threats to revoke ABC's licence, sparking free speech debates. President Trump welcomed the suspension but did not comment on Kimmel's reinstatement. Sinclair and Nexstar stations have refused to air the show, citing "insensitive" remarks. Critics, unions, and celebrities blasted Disney's decision as censorship, while FCC Democrat Anna Gomez condemned government intimidation. Protests and boycott calls targeted Disney platforms. Kimmel has not publicly addressed the controversy since his 15 September monologue.
