China's Xi pushes for global AI body at APEC in counter to U.S. Chinese President Xi Jinping took the spotlight at the APEC Summit in South Korea, calling for the creation of a World Artificial Intelligence Cooperation Organization to establish governance and enhance international collaboration—an effort aimed at positioning China as an alternative to the United States in global trade. Xi stressed that artificial intelligence should serve as "a public good for humanity," noting that the organization's headquarters could be based in Shanghai. Donald Trump skipped the summit after meeting with Xi, where the two reached a one-year deal to ease trade and technology restrictions. Xi also urged the free flow of green technologies as China prepares to host the 2026 APEC Summit in Shenzhen.

Tanzania president
re-elected as
hundreds feared
dead in unrest

President Samia Suluhu Hassan has won Tanzania's presidential election with 98% of the vote, extending her rule amid widespread unrest and allegations of fraud. The electoral commission reported a turnout of 87%, with nearly 32 million votes cast. Protests erupted across Dar es Salaam and other cities, as opposition groups denounced the vote as rigged and accused the government of repressing rivals. Rights groups cited hundreds of deaths in clashes with security forces, while the UN and Western nations expressed concern over the violence and lack of transparency. Samia's party, Chama Cha Mapinduzi (CCM), has never lost power since independence.

As US federal food
aid lapses, moststates unable tofill the void

Millions of Americans face uncertainty as the federal shutdown threatens SNAP food aid for 41 million recipients, including Roma Hammonds of Tennessee, who relies on \$563 monthly benefits. Only five states—Delaware, Virginia, Louisiana, Vermont, and New Mexico—and Washington, D.C. will fund some or all November benefits. Most states cite technical or financial limits. Two federal judges ordered the Trump administration to use \$5 billion in contingency funds, but no plan has been detailed. States like Virginia and Delaware are using surpluses, while food banks brace for rising demand. Both Republicans and Democrats blame each other as hunger risks surge.
