King wants
Andrew to lose
final military
title, minister
says

The UK Ministry of Defence is working to remove Prince Andrew Mountbatten-Windsor's final honorary military rank under the direction of King Charles, Defence Secretary John Healey confirmed, saying the King had "made his wishes clear." Andrew, who was stripped of his royal title last Thursday, retained his rank as Vice Admiral in the Royal Navy after relinquishing his other military positions in 2022. Healey described the move as "the right step, taken in accordance with the King's guidance." Royal author and journalist Valentine Low said the decision is a "blow" to Andrew, noting that "the King seems determined to strip his brother of everything."

Xinjiang has transformed from a controversial region accused of human rights abuses against the Uyghur minority into a booming tourist destination. After years of unrest and isolation, Beijing has invested billions to develop infrastructure and promote tourism, highlighting the region's natural beauty and cultural diversity in 2024, Xinjiang welcomed around 300 million visitors—more than double the number in 2018—generating about 360 billion yuan in tourism revenue. The government aims to attract over 400 million visitors annually by 2030 However, human rights groups warn that this tourism push is part of an effort to erase Uyghur cultural identity under state control.

Trump tells
military to
prepare for
'action' against
Islamist militants
in Nigeria

US President Donald Trump ordered preparations for military action in Nigeria, accusing its government of failing to halt killings of Christians. He told the Department of War to prepare plans and warned of force, saying aid would be cut if Nigeria did not act. Claims of genocide against Christians have circulated in right-wing US circles, but monitoring groups report no evidence Christians are being killed more than Muslims. Nigeria's government has not responded to the threat. President Bola Tinubu defended religious tolerance and said security challenges affect people across faiths and regions. The War Department confirmed it was preparing options.
