UK military to help protect Belgium after drone incursions Britain is sending military support to Belgium after several suspected Russian drone incursions into Belgian airspace. Defence Chief Sir Richard Knighton said personnel and equipment were being deployed following a request from Brussels. The incidents forced the temporary closure of Zaventem Airport and disrupted thousands of passengers. While Russia's involvement has not been confirmed, officials said it was "plausible" Moscow was behind the drones. UK Defence Secretary John Healey said the move underscores NATO's unity against hybrid threats. Germany also pledged antidrone assistance. Belgian officials warned that the incursions now threaten both military and civilian infrastructure across Europe.

Nearly a million
evacuated as
Philippines braces
for 'super
typhoon'

More than 900,000 people have been evacuated in the Philippines as Super Typhoon Fung-wong approaches landfall with winds of 185 km/h and gusts up to 230 km/h. Authorities warned of life-threatening storm surges over 3 meters high, severe flooding, and landslides, particularly across Luzon. The eastern Bicol region was first hit Sunday morning before the storm moved toward the Polillo Islands. Nearly 300 flights were canceled, and schools suspended classes. Fung-wong is expected to weaken after landfall between Baler and Casiguran but remain powerful. The storm follows Typhoon Kalmaegi, which killed nearly 200 people days earlier and devastated several provinces.

More than 1,400 flights cancelled as US air traffic cuts enter second day

More than 1,400 flights across the US were cancelled and nearly 6,000 delayed on Saturday as airlines cut schedules amid the ongoing federal government shutdown. The FAA reduced air travel capacity by up to 10% at 40 major airports, citing controller fatigue as staff work without pay. The shutdown, now in its 39th day, has stalled as Republicans and Democrats remain deadlocked over funding. American Airlines urged Washington leaders to reach a resolution. Newark Liberty, Charlotte/Douglas, and Chicago O'Hare airports saw the most cancellations, with Newark reporting average arrival delays exceeding four hours and departures delayed by 1.5 hours.
